What is the difference between a Catholic Bible and a Protestant Bible?

The main difference between a Catholic Bible and a Protestant Bible is in the seven books that a Catholic Bible includes and Protestant does not. These books are Wisdom, Sirach, Judith, Baruch, Tobit, 1 Maccabees and 2 Maccabees which Catholics refer to as Deuterocanonical, and Protestants as Apocrypha (from the Greek adjective "apocryphos") meaning "of doubtful authorship or authenticity".



Apocryphal writings are a class of documents rejected by some as being worthy to properly be called Scripture. However, these books have never been totally ignored. Martin Luther, for example, doubted the canonicity of four New Testament books: Hebrews, James, Jude and Revelation.

In 1546, Roman Catholic Church made a list of the books considered inspired (canon) and taken from the Septuagint. The Septuagint is the name of the original Greek translation of the Old Testament used by the Diaspora Jews (those who lived outside of the Holy Land) and early Christians. It was a time when Greek was the common language of the Mediterranean world, and the Hebrew language was dying.

When the Jewish rabbis developed their canon of the Bible they realized that it had all the same books of the Greek Septuagint with the exception of the seven books mentioned earlier. They simply decided not to include those seven books because they did not have Hebrew versions of them.

In the 1500s, the Protestant reformers followed Luther in deciding to go with the Jewish rabbis and delete the seven Deuterocanonical books of the canon (Apocrypha). Since then we have two Christian bibles: The Catholic Bible with 46 books and the Protestant Bible with 39. The nicest thing of all of this is the fact that today many Catholic priests and Protestant ministers study Scripture together.



II Sunday of Lent March 13, 2022

First Reading (Gen 15:5-12.17-18) The First Reading tells of God's promise to Abraham that he would have numerous descendants, and that those descendants would possess the land of Canaan. As a pledge of his fidelity God made a solemn covenant with him.

Psalm: The Lord is my light and my salvation.

Second Reading (Phil 3:17-4:1) Paul urges his converts to remain faithful to Christ, and promises them that one day they will share in his glory.

Gospel (Lk 9:28-36) We hear Luke's version of the transfiguration of Jesus on Mount Tabor. The chief significance of the Tabor experience was for Jesus himself, and this is what Luke emphasises.

The incident was meant to confirm him in the course he had taken. It comforted him to know that the road he was traveling was marked by the feet of prophets such as Moses and Elijah. The transfiguration also benefited the apostles. It prepared them for the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus, the Messiah.
