St. Ignatius of Loyola

Ignatius was born in the castle of Loyola in the Basque country of Spain about 1491, the youngest of eleven children. Like his brothers, he was trained to be a soldier, and it was while fighting against the French at Pamplona in 1521 that his military career was cut short by a cannonball that broke his leg. His leg was set poorly and had to be broken again, and Ignatius on his bed of pain tried to amuse himself by reading. The only books in the castle were a life of Christ and stories of the saints. These two books brought about a complete change in his life: he determined to dedicate his life to God, and when he was well, he went to make a retreat at Manresa, near the great abbey of Montserrat. It was here, in prayer and reflection, that St. Ignatius of Loyola began his *Spiritual Exercises*, the manual of his own spiritual life that was to become the backbone of Ignatian spirituality.

In 1523, he made a trip to the Holy Land and, after returning, began studies for the priesthood at Barcelona and Alcala. In 1528, he went to Paris to complete his studies and gathered around him six followers who would become the founding members of the Society of Jesus. After dedicating themselves to the service of God, they headed for Italy to go to the Holy Land.

When this was impossible because of the war between the Venetians and Turks, they went to Rome and offered themselves to the pope for any service he wished to assign them.

With the foundation of the Society of Jesus thus laid, Ignatius made his headquarters in Rome where he directed the work of the society and completed the constitutions of the order. Within a few short years, the Jesuits, as they were called, had spread throughout Europe and the world, and it was through their efforts that the re-evangelization of Europe began.

When Ignatius died in 1556, the Jesuits numbered over one thousand, scattered throughout nine European countries and provinces as well as India and the New World.

Ignatius died on July 31, 1556, and was canonized in 1622. Pope Pius XI declared him the patron of spiritual exercises and retreats.

Baptism Godparents


In baptism, the godfather represents the father and the godmother represents the mother.

XVIII Sunday in Ordinary Time July 31, 2022

The First Reading casts a cold eye on the vanity of human life. One example of this "vanity" is all the toil people put into acquiring wealth, only to have to leave it all to their heirs. The author is making the point that the things that are supposed to satisfy human beings do not satisfy them. Only faith in God and in an afterlife can provide a light in the darkness.

Psalm: Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.

The Gospel is part of a longer section which deals with the difficulties that possessions can cause for the disciples of Jesus. Here Jesus refuses to get involved in a family dispute. Instead, he focuses on the cause of the dispute—greed for possessions. His parable stresses the foolishness of depending on material things on one's security rather than on God. In his search for security and happiness in this life, the rich man forgets God, forgets eternal life, and forgets his obligation to the poor. He is truly a "fool" because he has not known how to use wisely the wealth which he had.
