What do we know about Santa Claus

St. Nicholas was born in Patara, around 280 A.D., in southwest modern-day Turkey, was much admired for his piety and kindness and became the bishop of Myra. During the Diocletian persecution he was imprisoned, but was later released unharmed. He is believed to have died on December 6, 343.

Nicholas was a rich man because his parents died when he was young leaving him a lot of money. This allowed him to help the poor, giving secret gifts to the needy.

One legend, that gives rise to the tradition of giving presents at Christmas, involves three girls, to each he is believed to have given a bag of gold as dowries to prevent them from being sold into the slavery of prostitution. Little by little his popularity grew and he became known as the protector of children and sailors.

The emperor Constantine built a basilica dedicated to Nicholas in Constantinople. At some point, the importance of Nicholas's cult in northern Europe appears to have become intertwined with Nordic myths reinforcing his association with the spirit of winter with snow and holly. During the Renaissance he became the most popular saint in Europe.

Wishing to build a reputation as a pilgrimage center, in 1087 the city of Bari in southern Italy endorsed a raid on Myra, and Nicholas bones were looted from there. To this day, every December 6, the sailors of Bari, carry his statue from the cathedral out to sea, so that he can bless the waters and to give them safe voyages throughout the year.

As one can see, the real St. Nicholas has little resemblance with the commercialized Santa Claus of the North Pole. As children grow up, sooner or later, they discover that there is no Santa Claus. And in some countries around the world the Christmas gifts are attributed to Baby Jesus.

There is no harm in singing that Santa Claus is coming to town... having a Santa Claus Parade, etc. But, ultimately Christmas is about Jesus. Jesus is the reason for the season!


