## The Hebrews and the Church

To understand the history of the Church, we must take a look at the history of the people among whom the Church began: the people of Israel.

Sometime in the second century B.C. called Abram, the Hebrew patriarch, out of Ur Kasdim, in Chaldea (the marshlands around the Tigre and Euphrates rivers) in Mesopotamia.

He is the first historical figure in the Bible and the first person to be called a Hebrew, which means a wanderer or nomad (like present day Bedouins).



Abram, later called Abraham ("friend of God") believed in one God while the rest of the world worshiped many gods. Thus, "Abraham stood on one side, and the rest of the world stood on the other side".

Around 1500 B.C. some Hebrew tribes became slaves in Egypt. Then in 1200 B.C., God raised up a great man named Moses and sent him to free the Hebrew slaves. Again they wandered in the desert for 40 years before they reached the land of Cannan. In this time in the desert God made a covenant with them and gave them the Ten Commandments.

For over 1000 years B.C., after king David, the people of Israel existed as a nation. Many times during these years, they forgot their covenant with Yahweh by cheating, neglecting the poor, or even worshiping the gods of their neighbours. Yahweh raised up prophets to call the people to remember the covenant. One of them named Isaiah dreamed of a king greater than David who would come and save his people. This saviour came to be called the Messiah, or in Greek, the Christ, which means the "anointed one". And with Christ, we have the New Testament and the Church. As for the Church, one could say that it started as Jewish but then became Christian with the conversion of the gentiles.



First Reading: (Isaiah 55,6-9) As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are God's ways above our ways.

# **Second Reading: (Philippians 1,20-24,27)**

Writing from prison, Paul is thinking of his death, and longing for complete union with Christ.

Gospel (Matthew 20,1-16) The First Reading states, 'God's was are not our ways, God's thoughts are not our thoughts'. Just how vast is the difference between God's ways and our ways, between God's thoughts and our thoughts, is illustrated in the Gospel.

These legalistically minded men were critical of Jesus faces up to his critics, and shows them what God is like: God is generous and full of compassion for the poor and the outcast. In that respect the parable is similar to that of the prodigal son.
