New Year

Around the world, different people began their secular calendar on different days. A January 1 was set for the Roman Empire in 45 B.C.E. by Julius Caesar with the creation of the Julian calendar. In 1582 Pope Gregory XIII sponsored a reform of the Julian calendar and reinstated January 1 as New Year's Day.

Speaking from his window overlooking St. Peter's Square, Pope Francis said: "We are all children of one heavenly father, we belong to the same human family and we share a common destiny. This brings a responsibility for each to work so that the world becomes a community of brothers who respect each other, accept each other in one's diversity and takes care of one another".

On New Years day all Catholics pray for peace in the world. A peace that is rooted in our own hearts. A peace that starts with us. A peace that is not defined as absence of war, but a peace that speaks of good relations based on respect for each other and respect for basic human rights. A peace that reflects God's blessings for all.

We should not to be indifferent to the violence and injustices present in so many parts of the world. There are things that should make us angry. As there are times to speak up and be counted. We should remember the words of Jesus: "Blessed are the peace makers, theirs is the kingdom of God."

Pope Francis has frequently blasted the weapons industry as "merchants of death" and has said that wars today are being used to try new weapons or use up old stock piles, and how can we even speak of peace, when arms production, sales and trade are on the rie?

The blessing in today's First Reading, perhaps one of the best known sections of the entire Torah, is a priestly blessing upon the people, derived from Moses's brother Aaron and his priestly descendants. The blessing is threefold, and is so beautiful that it's an integral part, not only of Jewish services, but of many Christian ones as well. It reads:

"The Lord bless you and keep you! The Lord let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!"

Holy Family of Nazareth

December 31, 2023

The prophet Zephaniah, writing in the seventh century BC, bids Jerusalem to rejoice because salvation is near. God stands in her midst and will deliver her from her enemies.

God is portrayed, not only as a king and warrior, but also as a loving bridegroom, who steadfastly loves his unworthy and unfaithful bride.

The theme of joy is even more emphatic in the Second Reading. Paul calls on the Philippians to rejoice because the Lord is near. (Paul was thinking about the Second Coming, which he believed was near.)

The theme of the nearness of the Lord is also at the heart of the Gospel. John the Baptist tells the people what they must do in order to prepare for the Lord's coming and to escape his searching judgment. At the same time he makes it clear that he is subordinate to Jesus.
