What's the real date of Christmas?

To answer this question, we have to start with the fact that we do not know exactly when Jesus was born. St. Luke reminds us that the first Christmas, the day of Jesus' birth, wasn't a holiday, but a working day. The truth is, no one knows the real birthday of Jesus. Most likely Jesus was born in the Spring and not in the Winter.

The early Christians certainly had different opinions about when it should be celebrated. The Romans celebrated the "Dies Natalis Solis Invicti" meaning the birthday of the unconquered sun on December 25. It was a festival in which they worshipped the sun for winning over the darkness of winter (and that's where Sunday comes from).

By the 4th century, the Christians in Rome were so many, and many were slaves it made sense to choose a day that was already a holiday and people did not have to work. By taking over this pagan festival (Saturnalia) the Christians gave it a new meaning: Jesus is the Son of God and He is the Light of the World.

What is the other date for Christmas?

The first recorded date of Christmas being celebrated on December 25th was in 336, during the time of Emperor Constantine. After that, Pope Julius I, decided that everybody should celebrate Christmas on December 25th. But not everybody agreed. St. John Chrysostom, urged the Christians in the east to celebrate Christmas on December 25th. They chose not to go along and to this day, like the Armenian Apostolic Church, they celebrate Christmas on January 6th which is for the Christians in the west, the feast of the Epiphany. And because many Orthodox and Coptic Churches still use the Julian calendar they celebrate Christmas on January 7th.

Who started the First Nativity Representation?

In the catacomb of St. Sebastian in Rome, there is a fresco from the 4th century which depicts Mary, Joseph and Jesus, an ox and a donkey. (The first Christmas card).

Later in 1223, St. Francis of Assisi, re-enacted the whole story with live animals, people, and a Mass that lasted just about the whole night. (The first Nativity representation).



Fourth Sunday of Advent

December 22, 2024

First Reading (Mic. 5:2-5a). When Micah was writing (late eighty-century BC) Jerusalem was under siege and David's dynasty was in jeopardy. But salvation would come from a comparatively insignificant place—Bethlehem. From there a new leader would come to gather together the scattered exiles and unite the nation once more. Christians see this promise as foreshadowing the coming of Jesus, the Prince of Peace, who was born in Bethlehem and descended from the line of David.

Psalm: Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved.

Second Reading (Heb 10:5-10). Jesus came, not to offer the sacrifices of the old law, but to do the will of God. His one perfect sacrifice replaced all the former sacrifices.

Gospel (Lk 1:39-45). The Gospel tells the story of Mary's visit to Elizabeth. Both are pregnant. Enlightened by the Holy Spirit, Elizabeth praises Mary and hints at the uniqueness of the child she has conceived.
