What is the difference betewwn a Catholic Bible and a Protestant Bible?

The main difference between a Catholic Bible and a Protestant Bible is in the seven books that a Catholic Bible includes and Protestant does not. These books are Wisdom, Sirach, Judith, Baruch, Tobit, 1 Maccabees and 2 Maccabees which Catholics refer to as Deuterocanonical and Protestants as Apocrypha (from the Greek adjective *apocryphos*) meaning of doubtful authorship or authenticity.

Apocryphal writings are a class of documents rejected by some as being worthy to properly be called Scripture. However, these books have never been totally ignored. Martin Luther, for example, doubted the canonicity of four New Testament books: Hebrews, James, Jude and Revelation.

In 1546, the Roman Catholic Church made a list of the books considered inspired (canon) and taken from the Septuagint. The Septuagint is the name of the original Greek translation of the Old Testament used by the Diaspora Jews (those who lived outside of the Holy Land) and early Christians. It was a time when Greek was the common language of the Mediterranean world, and the Hebrew language was dying.

When the Jewish rabbis developed their canon of the Bible they realized that it had all the same books of the Greek Septuagint with the exception of the seven books mentioned earlier. They simply decided not to include those seven books because they did not have Hebrew versions of them.

In the 1500s, the Protestant reformers followed Luther in deciding to go with the Jewish rabbis and delete the seven Deuterocanonical books of the canon (Apocrypha). Since then we have two Christian bibles: The Catholic Bible with 46 books and the Protestant Bible with 39. The nicest thing of all of this is the fact that today many Catholic priests and Protestant ministers study Scripture together. We have come a long way!



V Sunday in Ordinary Time February 9, 2025

The First Reading tells of the call of Isaiah to the ministry of prophecy. In a vision in the Temple, God reveals himself to Isaiah as the All-Holy One. The vision evokes in Isaiah a sense of his own sinfulness. But then, cleansed of his sins, he responds without hesitation to the divine call. This prepares us for the Gospel which deals with the call of the first disciples. Here again we see that it is God who takes the initiative, and also the total response he requires.

Psalm: Before the Angels I sing your praise, O Lord.

The miraculous catch of fish convinces Peter of the holiness of Jesus. This evokes in him a sense of their own sinfulness and unworthiness, so much so that he asks Jesus to depart from him. Peter has not yet grasped the fact that it was to call sinners that Jesus came, to call them away from sin to a new way of life.
