How Did the Early Christians Prepare for Initiation?

From apostolic times to our own day, Christian initiation involved a journey in several stages. Though historically the process varied in the time it took to complete, the following elements were always present: proclamation of the Word, acceptance of the Gospel, conversion, profession of the faith, Baptism itself, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit through the laying on of hands, and reception of the Eucharist.

Christianity was illegal in the first three centuries. Becoming a Christian was very serious business. It involved beginning a new life in Jesus Christ. It meant that a person had to renounce his or her former life. There was a possibility a convert would be *martyred*, or killed, for his or her faith either before or after being baptized.

Most converts to Christianity in the first century were adults. Thus it made sense to have a rather lengthy period of preparation—typically three years—before a person was fully initiated into the Church. To turn from a life of sin and embrace the life of love commanded by Jesus took sober thought, reflection, and formation. (When infant Baptism became the norm in later centuries, a post -baptismal **catechesis** was established.)

The period of preparation was called the *catechumenate*. During this time, the **catechumens** in partnership with sponsors learned about the Christian faith and became disciplined to the Christian way of life through prayer, fasting, and self-denial. The key emphasis was on conversion to Christ.

The Sacraments of Initiation themselves were celebrated at the Easter vigil after a forty-day period of prayer and formal instruction in the faith during Lent. In this proximate period of preparation, the candidate learned the Creed and the Lord's Prayer, the privileged prayer of Christians.

Those attending R.C.I.A. (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) are baptized during the Easter Vigil. At St. Mary's, registrations are done during the months of October and November. Anyone interested can call the church office and arrange to speak with a priest.

IV Sunday of Lent

March 30, 2025

A clear theme runs through all three readings: God's mercy to sinners. In the First Reading we have the beautiful words God spoke to his people: 'I have taken the shame of Egypt away from you'. The shame of sin and the darkness of slavery are behind them. The years of wandering in the desert are over; they have come home to the promised land. A new era was about to begin.

They mark their homecoming by celebrating anew the feast of Passover.
