Anointing of the Sick

Before the Second Vatican Council, the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick was commonly referred to as "the Last Rites", or "Extreme Unction", both suggesting a sense of finality. It was kept for "deathbed" situations.

Many a story has been told of a Catholic waking up from a deep sleep during a serious illness only to find a priest administering the Last Rites. Because this sacrament was the spiritual equivalent of calling 9-1-1, or even worse, throwing in the spiritual towel, one can imagine the devastating effect this might have had.

Even today, many chaplains reports that when they go to visit a sick Catholic, they are often greeted by a hand signaling no, "you don't need to visit me today; I am feeling just fine!"

At the same time, many Catholics call for a priest when they are seriously ill and love to be visited by a priest when they are in the hospital.

The Anointing of the Sick is a **healing** aid for those who are seriously ill. It is given to people going into serious surgery, the elderly and frail. It's healing for the body and soul. And yes, one can receive this sacrament more than once.

How is it done?

The priest lays his hands on the sick person and prays in silence. Then he anoints the forehead and hands of the person and says "through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save and raise you up".

The First Reading presents a vision of all peoples coming to Jerusalem to share in the blessings that God has conferred onto Israel.

Psalm: Go into all the world and proclaim the good news.

God wills that all people should be saved. People will have no advantage over the Gentiles.

Jesus refuses to get into the numbers game, or to speculate about matters that are best left to the wisdom and mercy of God. The main thing is: the kingdom is present and the door open. Besides, the door will not be open indefinitely.
